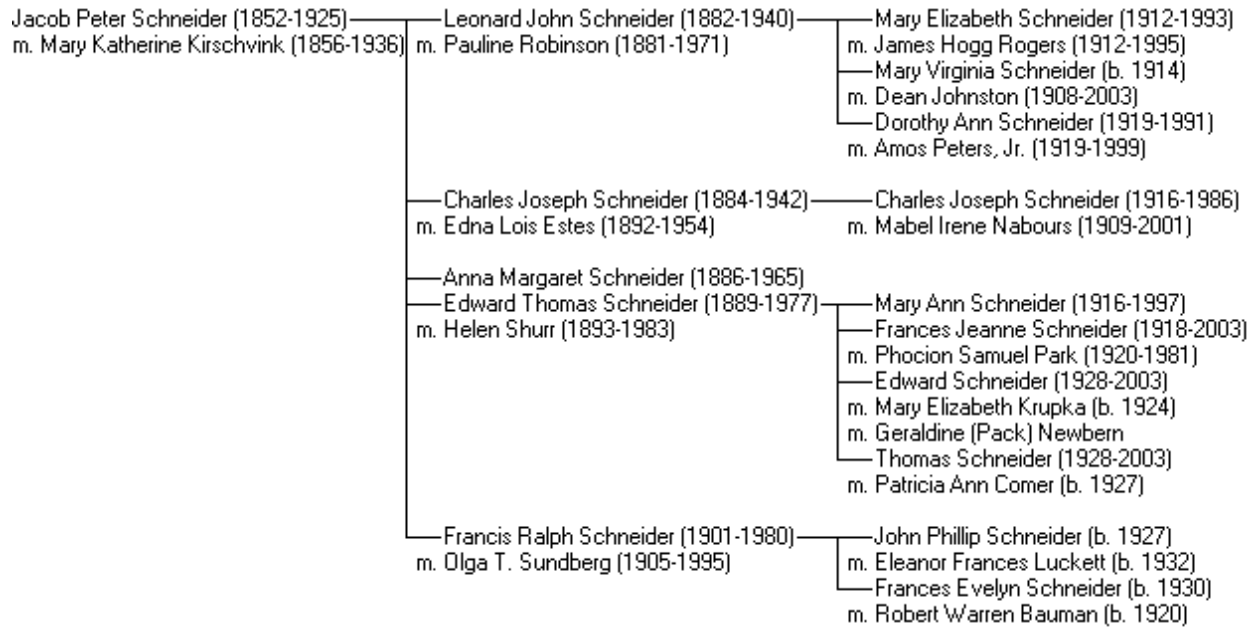

Leonard John Schneider 1882-1940

Leonard John ("L.J.", "Lennie") Schneider, eldest child of J.P. and Mary Kirschvink Schneider, was born 18 Nov 1882¹ in Austin, Travis County, Texas. He attended St. Mary's School and graduated from St. Edward's College, class of 1898.^{2 3} He studied business, played football for St. Edward's in 1896,⁴ played trumpet in the school orchestra and band and won a medal for academic First Honors in 1898.⁵

1903 at age 21, Leonard was a 2nd Lieutenant in the Austin Rifles, an infantry company of the Texas National Guard.⁶ This company was composed of the sons of some of the most prominent people in Austin. The captain was Joe Gilbert, Sr., a young doctor in Austin. Leonard's brother Charles Joseph was also a member.⁷

After graduation Lennie worked as a bookkeeper in

his father's store and then as a bookkeeper for the Austin Northwestern Railroad system. When the railroad was bought by the Houston & Texas Central, the office was moved to Houston.

Lennie's mother refused to allow him to move to Houston so he went to work for Raatz and O'Riley

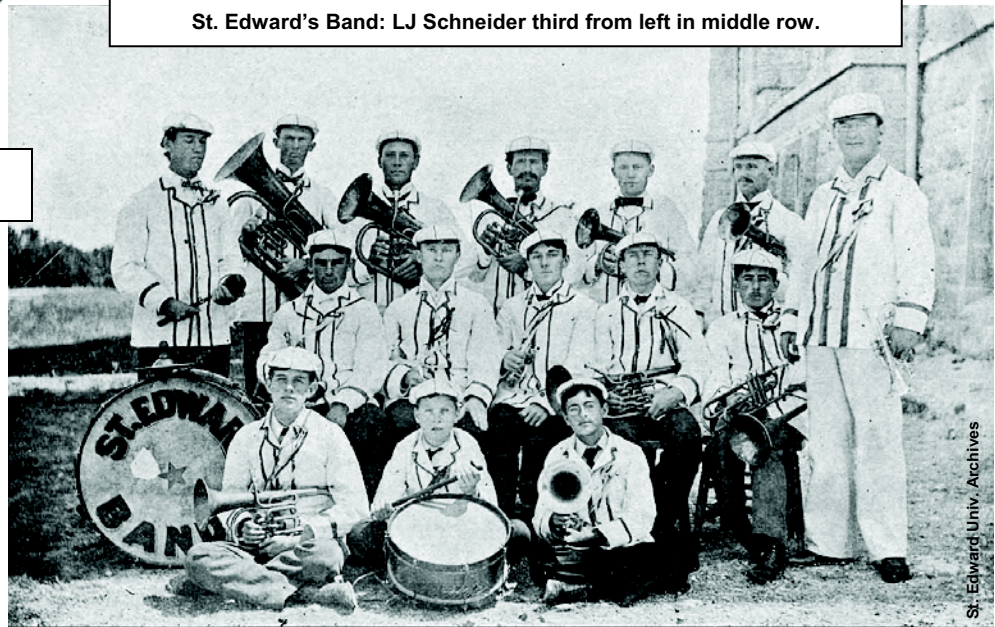
Merchants and then was hired by Major George W. Littlefield of the American National Bank as a teller.⁸ He was employed by the bank for 39 years, and worked his way up to vice-president, a position he held until the time of his death. He served as president of the Austin Chamber of Commerce and was a member of the Chamber's board of directors. He was active in the St. Edward's Alumni, the Knights of Columbus and for a time was state treasurer of B.P.O.E..⁹

Among the charming affairs arranged in honor of Miss Pauline Robinson and Mr. Leonard Schneider was the dinner given on Sunday evening by Mr. Thomas Butler, one of the attendants for the wedding which occurred yesterday. Only the bridal party participated. Another courtesy was the dinner on Friday evening which Mrs. Fred Fisher gave for Miss Pauline Robinson at her lovely new home which was thus most auspiciously opened for entertainment of her friends. The decorations were superb yellow chrysanthemums. American Beauty roses marked the honor place for the bride. The guests were eight of the bride's most intimate girl friends.

A very beautiful and impressively solemn ceremony was pronounced at St. Mary's church yesterday morning, with a solemn high mass, uniting in the holy bonds of matrimony two of Austin's most prominent and popular young people, Miss Pauline Robinson and Mr. Leonard John Schneider. The celebrants were the Rev. Father O'Keefe, Father Philand and Father Kelly, with Father Marr, master of ceremonies. The altar boys were Aubrey Kelly and Harry Holton. Professor Hartman presided at the organ while the full choir of St. Mary's gave the ceremonial responses. Miss Jane Cuern sang with sweetness and effect, "Reverence," and as an accompaniment to the sacred words of the binding ceremony the organ played in soft undertone, exquisite selections of appropriate bridal music. The church was beautifully decorated for the occasion, the altar being arrayed with massive palms and ferns, white roses and masses of white chrysanthemums. The flowers, the altar lights, the incense, the priestly robes of the celebrants and over all, the sunshine softened by the stained glass windows through which it shone, combined to give a most impressive setting to the bridal scene of surpassing beauty. The bride was attended by her sister, Miss Josephine Robinson, maid of honor. Preceding her was the beautiful little ring bearer, Miss Pauline Haberman, bearing the golden circlet on a silver salver. The bride advanced to the altar on the arm of her uncle, who gave her into the keeping of the man of her choice, who was waiting with his best man, Mr. Charles Schneider, at the foot of the altar. The bride was exquisitely fair and sweet in a wedding gown of marquisette over white brocade and trimmed with rare lace. She carried a superb bouquet of bride roses, tied with tulle, and showered with lilacs-of-the-valley. A large picture hat of pure white was attractively worn. The maid of honor was becomingly gowned in pink marquisette over pink brocade, and banded with pink meshine, bordered with fur. She wore an exquisite hat of pink, with pink plumes. Her trousseau were visible in a general cluster, mingled with maiden-hair ferns. The happy ring bearer was daintily

attired in a white cotton over pink with little white shoes and stockings, a hat of white beaver trimmed with white marabout, caught at one side with a pink rose. Pink sash and ribbons completed the attractive little maiden's costume.

The ushers were Messrs. Thomas, Butler, Will Schneider, Robinson and Earl Cornwell.

After the ceremony a wedding breakfast was served the bridal party and immediate relatives at the home of the bride's mother, Mrs. Pauline Robinson, after which good-byes were spoken and the bride and groom departed on their bridal journey to San Antonio and other points. The bride's gown and gown was of modish white-brocade of a greenish blue, with hat and other accessories to correspond.

504 West 14th Street

On 9 Nov 1910, Leonard married **Pauline Robinson** (born 3 May 1881 in Austin, Texas). According to The Austin Daily Statesman, it was a wedding joining “two of Austin’s most prominent and popular people.”¹⁰ Pauline was the daughter of Alfred Henry Robinson and Pauline Bremond and grew up in a household with four sisters and two brothers. Pauline was the next to youngest child. In addition to her siblings, Pauline was surrounded by Bremond and Robinson cousins in her neighborhood, known today as the Bremond Block. Pauline had polio as a young girl and was left with a withered arm, but one was rarely aware of her handicap. She graduated from St.

Mary’s Academy in Austin and later was very active in the school’s alumnae organization. She was also an active member of St. Mary’s Catholic Church and the Altar and Rosary Society.¹¹

The couple’s first home was on 14th Street in a small rented house just around the corner from the large home of Pauline’s eldest sister, Elizabeth Robinson Haldeman and her husband Horace.¹² It was not at all unusual for Horace to call the two younger relatives to come over and help him “pick the meat off the left over turkey”.¹³ Shortly after Pauline and Leonard moved into their home they were joined briefly by Pauline’s sister, Josephine Robinson, and her new husband, Thomas Butler.



303 West 12th Street

Two daughters, Elizabeth and Virginia, were born while the family lived on 14th Street.

The third daughter, Dorothy, was born in 1919 after the family moved to 303 W. 12th Street.¹⁴ “12th Street was a wonderful home in which to grow up. It had a swing on the front porch for lazy afternoons; a large

bath room for a tub bath before bed time; a cool screened-in sleeping porch up among the tree branches; and a large green esplanade down the middle of 12th Street where the children could gather to catch lighting bugs or play Red-Rover.”¹⁵



The family was living on 12th Street when the Tornado of 1922 split in half and circled Austin. L. J. was at the bank when the tornado warning sounded. He immediately ran home to his family and arrived before the family had heard the news of the coming storm. All were safe¹⁶ but the tornado heavily damaged St.

Edward's University and L.J. sent out letters to the public seeking help to rebuild his alma mater.¹⁷



301 West 13th Street

After a fire had ruined the second story of the 12th Street home, the family moved in 1924 to 301 West 13th Street.¹⁸ The house on 13th Street was built in 1899 by Thomas Watt Gregory, an internationally known attorney for whom Gregory Gym at the University of Texas was named.¹⁹ Pauline, who had grown up on "The Bremond Block", urged L. J. to purchase the house that was befitting a banker, a

stately home with beautiful wood doors, trim and floors. The family resided at the 13th Street address until the 1954²⁰ and the house was demolished in 1955.²¹ Descendents owned the property until 2007.

In addition to his civic involvement and busy family life, Leonard was active in the Catholic community and was a charter member of the Knights of Columbus Council Number 1017. His position at the American National Bank gave him expertise that he shared with the church. In the 1920s Leonard was directly involved in the establishment of what is today called St. Helen's Catholic Church in Georgetown, Texas.

The following quote from the St. Helen Church website, details the history of Leonard Schneider's involvement with the parish:

In the 1920s a small group of predominantly Hispanic Catholics, having no place to attend Mass, asked Father O'Reilly, C.S.C., to celebrate Mass for them in Georgetown. Father O'Reilly, who had been a professor of Spanish at Notre Dame University in Indiana, came to Austin in 1904, was chaplain at Seton Hospital in Austin, and in 1905 Fr. O'Reilly organized the Knights of Columbus council 1017.

With the growth in church membership in the Georgetown area, the need for a Catholic Church became more imperative. However, great difficulty lay in even finding property much less in actually acquiring it. Georgetown, being a Protestant town, had strong reservations about Catholics. Under these conditions, it was a formidable task to lay the foundations of a Catholic Church. Father O'Reilly believed, however, he should begin.

After initial disappointments in attempts to purchase a suitable site, he enlisted the aid of Mr. Leonard

Schneider, an executive in an Austin bank. Mr. Schneider was able to purchase two lots on which the church was built. So secretive were the negotiations that no one in Georgetown knew that the property was bought for the church. It was not until Mr. Schneider transferred the title to Bishop C.E. Bryne that the people knew a Catholic Church was being built. Unofficial sources dating back to that time reveal that the initial purpose of purchasing the land stated it was to establish a "beauty parlor," to keep secret the real reason for its acquisition. Thus the "beauty parlor" became the "House of God."²²

Leonard was a respected banker, a civic leader, a religious man, but above all, he was a family man. "Uncle Lennie" entertained the children at Halloween at Joe Martin's house by leading everyone in a circle around the dining room table, singing and chanting verses:

"When the witches begin to witch,
And you don't know which witch is which,
Well, supposen....!

And a great big bugaboo
Reached out his long claws for you,
Supposen....!"²³

Pauline, known as "Auntie" or "Granny", was a favorite of all. She and Lennie spent weekends with family and friends at the family ranch on the banks of the Colorado River in northwestern Travis County. Weekends were filled with picnics, pick-up baseball games, fishing and tall tales. Pauline loved to fish,

was a wonderful hostess and never said an unkind word.

The close-knit family received a blow when Leonard died suddenly on 19 May 1940²⁴ after seeming to recover from a long illness. Following her husband's death, Pauline remained the head of the household until all three daughters were married.²⁵

During World War II Pauline, her daughters and grandchildren lived together at the 13th Street house while the sons-in-

law were in the military service. Following the war, Elizabeth and Jim Rogers and their two children and Dean and Virginia Johnston and their oldest daughter lived with Pauline until 1951 when Dean and Virginia moved to Rollingwood, a suburb of Austin.²⁶ In 1954 Pauline moved with Jim and Elizabeth Rogers to Marshall Lane in Austin. When the Rogers moved to Amarillo in the early 1960s Pauline stayed in Austin and lived with Dean and Virginia Johnston at 2500 Hatley Drive.

Pauline was a charming woman and loved dearly by all her family and grandchildren. When she was a young girl, Pauline was warned not to go "as far north" as what is now Wooldridge Park" because that is where the Indians camped. Her life spanned the age from Indian times to modern technology and she particularly enjoyed the afternoon soap operas on television.²⁷

Pauline died 2 Jun 1971²⁸ at her daughter Virginia Johnston's home. Leonard and Pauline are both buried in Mt. Calvary Cemetery, Austin, Texas in Section C.

Austin Banker Succumbs

L. J. Schneider Dies Suddenly At Home Here

Leonard John Schneider, vice president of the American National bank and lifelong resident of Austin, was claimed by death Sunday at 9:45 a. m., only a few days after he had sufficiently recovered from a long illness to return to his desk at the bank.

Mr. Schneider died at his home, 301 West 13th street. He had complained Friday and Saturday of not feeling well, but until he was seized with the fatal attack Sunday morning, had seemed well on the road to recovery from the illness of several months.

Funeral Tuesday

Mr. Schneider was 58 years of age, son of the late J. P. Schneider, one of Austin's earliest merchants. He leaves his widow, Mrs. Pauline Robinson Schneider, three daughters, Misses Virginia and Dorothy Schneider, and Mrs. James H. Rogers, all of Austin; three brothers, Charles J. Schneider, E. T. Schneider and F. R. Schneider, and a sister, Sister Margaret Mary of a Dallas convent.

Rosary services will be held at the home Monday night. Burial will be in the Mount Calvary cemetery.

Active pallbearers will be George E. Robinson, Al Robinson, Jr., Robinson Butler, P. J. Butler, Jr., Charles J. Schneider, Jr., and Ed Nagle. Honorary pallbearers will be officers and directors of the American National bank, and of the Austin Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Schneider last year was president of the chamber of commerce, and until the time of his death was a member of its board of directors.

He graduated from St. Mary's school and the then St. Edward's college. After his graduation, his first job was bookkeeper in the store of his father. He then for a time was with the Southern Pacific system, and for a time, with the firm of Rantz and O'Reilly, merchants. In 1901, the late Major George W. Littlefield employed him in the American National bank, and he was with the bank through the 39 years until his death. He worked up through various positions to cashier and vice president, having served as vice president for the past 10 years.

Mr. Schneider was active in work of the Knights of Columbus organization, and has served as a member of the board of directors of its student loan fund. He was a member of St. Mary's Catholic church.

For a time, he served as state treasurer of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks.

Mr. Schneider became treasurer of the Austin Chamber of Commerce 23 years ago, and held that office continuously for 21 years, until his election as president of the chamber in 1939.

At the completion of his term as president, his illness prevented his attending the annual meeting this year, at which time his successor was installed and he was elected a member of the board of directors of the organization.

Funeral Services Conducted For Schneider at St. Mary's

Amidst the solemn ritual of the Catholic church, funeral services were said at 9 a. m. today in St. Mary's parish church for L. J. Schneider, 58, vice president of the American National bank.

"May his memory live as a benediction to cheer and comfort you in your sorrow and pain, and may you meet him where faith is transformed to the vision of God," the Rev. James J. O'Brien, celebrant of the low funeral mass, told the immediate family.

Church Filled to Capacity

Assisting Father O'Brien, pastor of St. Mary's church, in celebrating the low mass, were Father Joe Branigan, assistant St. Mary's pastor; Father Dennis O'Shea, chaplain at Seton hospital; the Very Rev. Patrick J. Haggerty, president of St. Edward's university; the Rev. Paul Folk of St. Edward's; Father Patrick Duffy, pastor of St. Ignatius church; Father Francis Weber of Holy Cross church; Father Robert Grant of Guadalupe church; Father Raymond Clancy of St. Edward's; and Father Robert Burns of St. Austin's chapel.

St. Mary's church was filled to capacity for the services with business, civic, social, and church leaders present. Representing the Sisters of St. Vincent de Paul, the order in charge of Seton hospital, were Sister Madeline and Sister Georgiana.

A Life of Love

"Man is not destroyed through death," Father O'Brien said. "Death is only a change, a transition to glory if we have kept His commandments, loving God and loving

our neighbor. Love is the very essence of Christianity. Mr. Schneider lived a life of love, a Christian life. He was a faithful husband, a loving and conscientious father and a true and loyal man.

"He was industrious and intelligent in the banking business, and so he has left to his beloved ones a rich inheritance of a good example of a life well lived for God and for his fellow man," Father O'Brien said.

"He was a devout Christian, he had the courage to show his religious convictions and live up to them; what more can you say of any man than that he lived his life for his family, for his community, and for his church?" Father O'Brien asked.

Mr. Schneider died Sunday morning at his home of a heart attack after he apparently had recovered from a long illness. The American National bank remained closed until noon today out of respect to his memory. Mr. Schneider was a life-long resident of Austin and he had been connected with the bank for 39 years. For 21 years he was treasurer of the Austin Chamber of Commerce and last year served as its president.

Active pallbearers at the services this morning were George E. Robinson, Al Robinson, Jr., Robinson Butler, P. J. Butler, Jr., Charles J. Schneider, Jr., and Ed Nagle. Honorary pallbearers were directors and officers of the bank and the Chamber of Commerce.

Ushers at the St. Mary's services were F. J. Kinane, Dr. R. L. Struthall, Ted Kunz, V. A. Pannell and M. J. Hrebec.

Burial was in Mt. Calvary cemetery.

Charles Joseph Schneider 1884-1942

Charles Joseph Schneider, the second child of J.P. and Mary K. Schneider, was born 26 May 1884.¹ Charles was tall and slender and wore glasses.² He graduated from St. Edward's College³ and worked for his father at Schneider & Bros. and then at Cordz Milling Company. After a short while he left Cordz and went to work for Swift & Company's Austin office and was employed there for over 34 years.⁴ He started work for the company as a shipping clerk, was

promoted to salesman and was named manager in 1912.⁵

On 3 Nov 1915⁶ Charles married **Edna Lois Estes** who was born 20 Jun 1892.⁷ Lois was a graduate of St. Mary's Academy and an accomplished musician, both in voice and in

piano.⁸ Lois was very active in the St. Mary's alumnae association.⁹ She served as state governor of the Texas Chapter of the International Federation of Catholic Alumnae and in 1924 was in charge of arrangements for the organization's state convention in Galveston, Texas.¹⁰

Following their marriage, Charles and Lois lived at 608 Ruiz¹¹ (now Lamar) then moved to 1516 Forest Trail.¹² In 1926 Charles was involved in a serious pedestrian accident that made news headlines.¹³

Charles was very civic minded and was a member of St. Mary's Church. He was a charter member of the

Knights of Columbus Instituted Council No. 1017¹⁴ and rose to the level of grand knight of the council. He was also an exalted Ruler of the Elks, a director of the Chamber of Commerce and a member of the Rotary Club. He served as president of the Holy Name Society, was on the board of trustees of St. Mary's Academy and was a member of the Austin Rifles.

Charles and Lois had one child, Charles Joseph "Junior" Schneider, Jr. Charles, Lois, and Junior

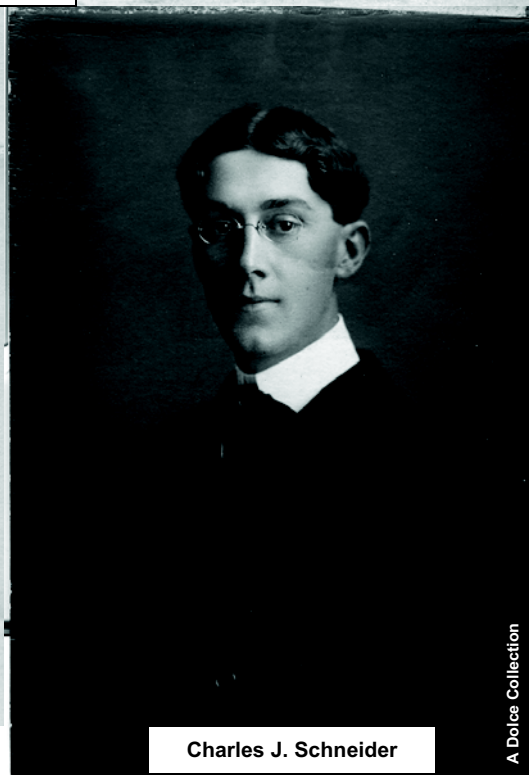

spent many weekends at the family ranch on the banks of the Colorado River, fishing and picnicking with his brother and sister-in-law, Lennie and Pauline Schneider, and other family members.¹⁵

Nearing retirement age, Swift & Company wanted Charles to move to another city but he told them no and went in business for himself.¹⁶ At the time of his death he and Herbert Gerth¹⁷ owned the Capital City Provision Company.¹⁸

Charles died 18 Nov 1942¹⁹ and Lois died 8 Jun 1954.^{20 21} Both are buried in Mt. Calvary Cemetery in Austin, Texas.

Smith. The bridesmaids then came singly. They were daintily gowned in one design costumes. Callot models of apple green charmeuse overdressed in green silk net. Beautiful garden hats with transparent net brims with pink roses tucked in the facing were worn. The bride's going-away costume was of brown velvet with trimmings of beaver and hat to harmonize also trimmed with beaver.

Beautiful gifts from many sources attested the high esteem and love of many friends. Gifts of gold pocket-knives were presented by the groom to the groomsmen and turquoise set la vallieres were gifts of the bride to her maids. The little ringbearer and flower girls received miniature wedding rings.

When Mr. and Mrs. Schneider return from their wedding trip they will go to housekeeping in their own new bungalow at 603 Ruiz Street.

Mrs. Schneider is known for her charming personality and accomplishments, for she not only numbers her friends by her acquaintances, but is an accomplished musician, both piano and voice, and is renowned for her home-making abilities. She is the daughter of Mrs. M. Estes and has lived here for most of her life. She was educated at St. Mary's Academy, where she graduated several years ago.

Mr. Schneider is a member of a pioneer family to Austin. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Schneider. He received his education at St. Edward's College, where he graduated. He is a young business man of the highest standing and is the manager of Swift & Co. here. He is State treasurer of the Knights of Columbus and a prominent member of the Elks and Rotary Clubs.

C. J. SCHNEIDER BADLY INJURED BY MOTOR CAR

Charles J. Schneider, 606, Ruiz street, manager of the Austin office of Swift & Company was seriously injured, when he was struck by an automobile driven by E. E. Young, manager of the local Overland-Willys Knight automobile agency, on Congress avenue between Third and Fourth streets, at 5:15 Friday evening.

Mr. Schneider, according to information available, had started across the street to the Brown & O'Brien drug store when he collided with the car driven by Mr. Young going north on Congress avenue, and knocked to the pavement. Mr. Schneider was rendered unconscious and fears were entertained that he had been seriously injured internally.

Rushed to Hospital.

The injured man was rushed in a C. H. Cook ambulance to Seton infirmary where an examination of his injuries was made by Dr. Joe Gilbert.

Charles J. Schneider is the son of the late J. P. Schneider and is one of the best known young business men of Austin. He is a prominent member of the Knights of Columbus and served for many years as district deputy of the Austin district besides holding a number of other offices in Capital City Council No. 1017 of that order. He is also a member of the board of trustees of St. Mary's academy and Mrs. Charles J. Schneider during the past year was governor of the International Federation of Catholic Alumnae of Texas.

Prominent in Civic Work.

Mr. Schneider is also a prominent member of the Austin Rotary club in which organization he has been active in many committee appointments.

Mr. Schneider is a brother of Leonard J. Schneider, vice president of the American National bank; Ed Schneider of the Elgin-Trotter Brick and Tile company, and Ralph Schneider, manager of the J. P. Schneider grocery firm. A sister is a religious in a Catholic academy at Bryan.

At 7:35 p. m. Dr. Gilbert announced at Seton infirmary that an x-ray examination showed no fracture of the skull and that Mr. Schneider appeared to be regaining consciousness at that hour. Mr. Schneider is believed to be suffering from concussion but hopes was expressed at Seton infirmary that Mr. Schneider has a chance to recover. No one was permitted to visit Mr. Schneider's room. It was announced.

V. L. Lehman of Brenham who was riding in the car with Mr. Young, suffered a bruised and sprained wrist when the car struck Mr. Schneider the shock knocking Mr. Lehman's left wrist against the door jam. Mr. Lehman was sitting on the right side with his hand hanging out the open car window when the accident occurred.

A one dollar bill which is believed to have been carried by Mr. Schneider as he was struck was found on the floor of the car after the accident. Mr. Schneider threw up his hands and thrust them inside the car just before he fell to the pavement, Mr. Lehman said. The accident occurred when Mr. Schneider had just dodged a taxicab and ran into the Thomas car, according to Mr. Lehman.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Lois E. Schneider; a son, Charles J. Schneider, Jr.; a sister, Sister Margaret Mary of Dallas, and two brothers, E. T. and F. Ralph Schneider, both of Austin.

Rosary services will be held Wednesday at 8 p. m. at the residence and the solemn requiem high mass at St. Mary's Catholic church at 9 a. m. Thursday.

Mr. Schneider was born in Austin and has been in business here for the past 40 years. He was one of the owners of the Capital City Provision company.

A prominent member of many organizations, he was well known for the part he took in civic work. He was a member of St. Mary's church all his life and was an alumnus of St. Edward's university.

Mr. Schneider was a former grand knight of the Capital City council of the Knights of Columbus. During World War I, he was state deputy of the Knights of Columbus in Texas. He is a past exalted ruler of the Elks and a former director of the Chamber of Commerce. He had served as president of the Holy Name society. He was also a member of the old Austin Rifles under the command of Dr. Joe Gilbert.

Anna Margaret Schneider 1886-1965

Anna Margaret “Annie” Schneider, the only daughter of J. P. and Mary K. Schneider, was born 22 Dec 1886.¹ Anna, or “Annie” as she was known to her family, had an older cousin, Elizabeth “Bess” Kirschvink, who was an Ursuline nun. Annie followed her cousin’s lead as she began her adult life. Anna entered the Ursuline Order on 8 Sep 1908 and made her religious profession on 22 Feb 1911. She received a B.S. degree in education from St. Louis University in 1911.² Anna Margaret was known as “Mother Margaret Mary” and for eighteen years taught at Villa Maria Academy in Bryan, Texas. She moved to Dallas in 1929. She was a teacher of English, religion, mathematics, art, Latin, and history.

Even though the Ursuline Order was not a cloistered order, the community still maintained a separation from the secular world. When Anna Margaret’s father died, she came to Austin with two other nuns and was not allowed to visit with the family.³ It must have been very difficult for the family to be so physically separated from their only daughter. She did keep in close contact with her family through letters and holiday mementos, many of which have survived in family collections.

Mother Margaret Mary died 25 Jan 1965⁴ or 1964.^{5 6} She is buried in the Ursuline Community Cemetery in Dallas, Texas.⁷

Funeral Set Monday For Nun

Rosary for Mother Margaret Mary Schneider, 78, Ursuline Academy high school teacher, will be recited hourly beginning at 1 p.m. Sunday in the Ursuline Academy Chapel. A Requiem Mass will be celebrated at 10 a.m. Monday in the chapel. Burial will be in Ursuline Community Cemetery.

Mother Margaret Mary who had been at the academy for 35 years, died here Saturday.

She came to Dallas after serving as a teacher and treasurer at Villa Maria Academy at Bryan.

At Ursuline she was principal from 1933 to 1938 and from 1940 to 1943. She was teaching English, American history, algebra and Latin at the time of her death.

She entered the Order of the Society of the Ursuline Nuns in 1908 and took a B.S. degree in education at St. Louis University at St. Louis in 1911.

She had been in charge of curricular development at the school at various times.

Ursuline Nun Dies



DALLAS -- Mother Margaret Mary Schneider, O.S.U., principal of Ursuline Academy from 1933 to 1943, died suddenly early Saturday, January 25. While the body lay in state in the Convent Chapel from one o'clock on Sunday until the Requiem High Mass on Monday, January 27 at 10 a.m. the Rosary was recited hourly.

Requiem Mass was offered by Rt. Rev. Msgr. Wm. F. O'Brien, P.A. and Vicar General for Religious, in Ursuline Chapel on Monday, January 27.

Burial followed in Ursuline Cemetery. Pallbearers were Dr. Michael Kurlica, Martin Curran, C.E. Fisk, John Marshall, Dr. F.W. Veenings and A.C. Moser Jr.

Mother Margaret Mary, the former Anna Margaret Schneider of Austin, Texas, entered the Ursuline Order on September 8, 1905. After preliminary training, Mother made her Religious Profession on February 22, 1911. For eighteen years, she taught at Villa Maria Academy in Bryan, Texas.

In 1929, Mother Margaret Mary came to Dallas where she has been, with the exception of another year of study at St. Louis University, St. Louis, Missouri, for the past thirty-five years.

Known principally as "the English teacher," Mother Margaret Mary successfully taught Religion, Mathematics, Latin and History. She was moderator of the Ursuline Alumnas Association during the 1930's. After fifty-three years as an Ursuline Religious and Educator, Mother Margaret Mary served as librarian at Ursuline Academy at the time of her death.

Survivors of Mother Margaret Mary are two brothers, Edward Thomas Schneider and F. Ralph Schneider, both of Austin.

Edward Thomas Schneider 1889-1977

Edward Thomas “E. T.” Schneider, was born 30 Jun 1889.^{1 2 3} He began school in 1896 at St. Mary's Parochial School for Boys and won a scholarship to Saint Edward's College. He graduated from St. Edward's with a commercial degree in bookkeeping in 1904.⁴ He returned for the 1907-1908 school year. He did not complete another degree but was active on campus and played football.⁵ He did well academically, earning a Gold Medal donated by General

William R. Hamby for having the highest average in Christian Doctrine, Third Course. He also received “Premiums” in 1st Algebra, Geometry, Physics, General History, and 4th English.

Following school, Edward worked for his father at Schneider & Bros.. Then in 1909 he began working at the Elgin-Butler Brick Company as a stenographer and bookkeeper. He worked there thirty-five years, rising to the position of office manager.⁶

Edward married **Helen Vivian Shurr** on 1 Mar 1916 at the Church of the Immaculate Conception in Austin, Texas.⁷ Helen was born 06 Jun 1893⁸ in Austin, Texas. She was baptized on 11 Jan 1893 at St.

Mary's Church in Austin⁹ and graduated from St. Mary's Academy in 1913 where she met and became friends with her future sister-in-law, Lois Estes. For many years, Helen made and sold beautiful cakes out of her home.¹⁰

E. T. and his wife initially lived with his in-laws then later moved to a house at 402 E. 11th St. (phone 6952) and finally built a home in 1933 on a lot they purchased in the 1920s at 1711 Cromwell Hill, Austin, Texas where they lived until their final years.¹¹

Although not widely traveled (Edward had never been outside of Texas until he attended his son Thomas' wedding in Cincinnati, Ohio in 1956), he knew the location of every little town in Texas since Elgin-Butler shipped bricks to towns all over the state. Edward had a nervous breakdown around the time of World War II and left his job for a while. When he returned to work he first got a job with the Internal Revenue Department and then with Elgin Standard Brick Company, for whom he worked for sixteen years. He retired in the 1950s.¹²

Edward was active in St. Mary's Parish and helped count the weekly church collection. Helen and E.T. had four children: twin boys Thomas and Edward, and two

The priests were vested in golden robes and with the lighted altar, ferns and palms, a brilliant setting for the ceremony was effected.

Just before the wedding Victor Schmidt sang "O My Father, My Father, Hearth and Home" and William Morris accompanied on the violin.

At the communion time just as the bride and groom received Holy Communion, Miss Jane Carter sang beautifully "O Lord I Am No Warrior".

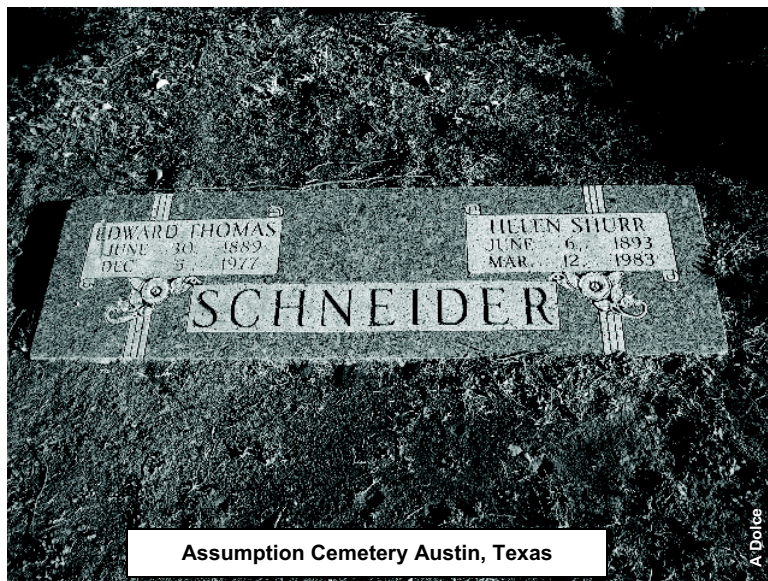
Edward developed heart trouble later in life, had several heart attacks and had one of the first generation of heart pacemakers implanted in his chest. He and wife Helen lived their final years in a nursing home in Austin, where he died suddenly of a heart attack. Edward died 05 Dec 1977^{14 15} and Helen died Mar 12, 1983.^{16 17}

managed the family general store after his father's death and added a saloon in the rear in 1933 after repeal of prohibition. The store closed in 1935. At the time of his mother's death in 1936 he was the operator of the Handy-Andy store in South Austin on South Congress just south of the Texas School for the Deaf.³

Ralph married **Olga Theresia Sundberg** who was born 07 May 1905.⁴ Olga and Ralph were married 18 Feb 1925^{5 6} in the home of his oldest brother and sister-in-law, Leonard and Pauline Schneider, at 301 W. 13th Street.⁷ Olga's mother objected to her daughter marrying a Catholic⁸ but Olga later converted to Catholicism and she worked devotedly for many Catholic organizations.⁹

Olga helped Ralph operate and manage several food stores from 1940-1960 including the Handy-Andy Store and the Red and White Grocery at 29th and Guadalupe streets.

During the 1960s Olga worked as an assistant recording clerk for the Texas State Senate. She was a founding member of Seton Hospital Auxiliary and the Baby Home Guild for the Home of the Holy Infancy.

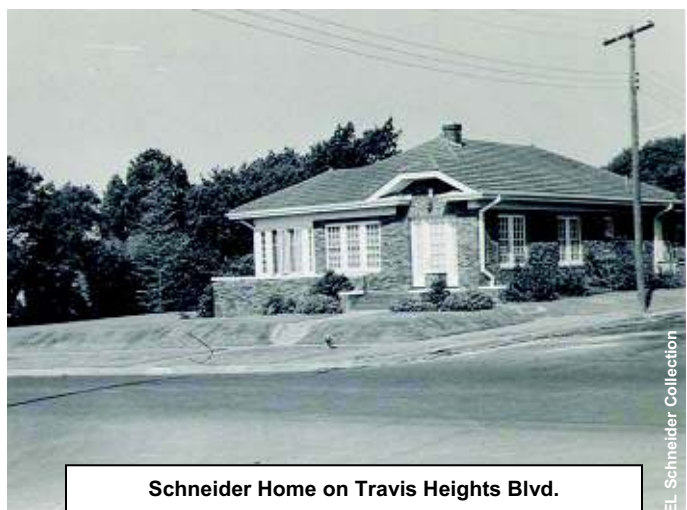

Albert Schneider Jr. 1878-1950

Albert Schneider Jr., oldest son of Albert and Christina Schneider, was born either on 23 Oct 1877^{1 2} or on 23 Oct 1878^{3 4} in Austin, Travis County, Texas. The 1880 census which was taken in June 1880 lists Albert,

Christina and two children: Albert Jr. age 1 and Willie age 9/12.⁵ Taking all the references into account, 23 Oct 1878 is the date that seems to be most accurate for Albert Jr.'s birth date. Albert played the mandolin⁶, worked in his father's saloon and was an engraver. In 1900 Albert Jr. lived with his parents at 206 East 1st Street and worked as a bartender in his father's saloon. In 1910 Albert Jr. continued to live with his parents and taught music.⁷

In 1926 Albert married **Minnie Pepper**⁸, who was born 6 Nov 1888⁹ in Alabama.¹⁰ Minnie came to Texas with her parents, Sara and Thomas Pepper, and lived on a farm in Travis County with nine brothers and sisters.¹¹ In 1920 Minnie (age 32) roomed at 502 East 5th Street and was a sales clerk at T.H. Williams,¹² a local dry goods store.¹³ Albert and Minnie dated a number of years before they married. Minnie's sister had many children and Minnie helped put them through school.¹⁴ After Albert and Minnie married she continued to work as a clerk and Albert Jr. worked in a printing establishment as an engraver. In the Travis County Marriage records her name is listed as Pippier, but all other records indicate her name was Pepper.

Albert and Minnie resided at 206 East 1st Street in

Austin, Travis County, Texas and Albert's aunt, Mary Katherine Kirschvink Schneider and his uncle, Leonard Kirschvink, lived next door at 210 East 1st Street.¹⁵ Minnie and Albert's great-niece, Barbara Pecot Parham, fondly remembers visiting Aunt Minnie and Uncle Albert.

Albert died 30 Oct 1950^{16 17} and Minnie died 13 Aug 1967. Both are buried in Austin Memorial Park, section 7, row 138, graves 7 and 8 with Minnie's sister and her descendents. The couple had no children.

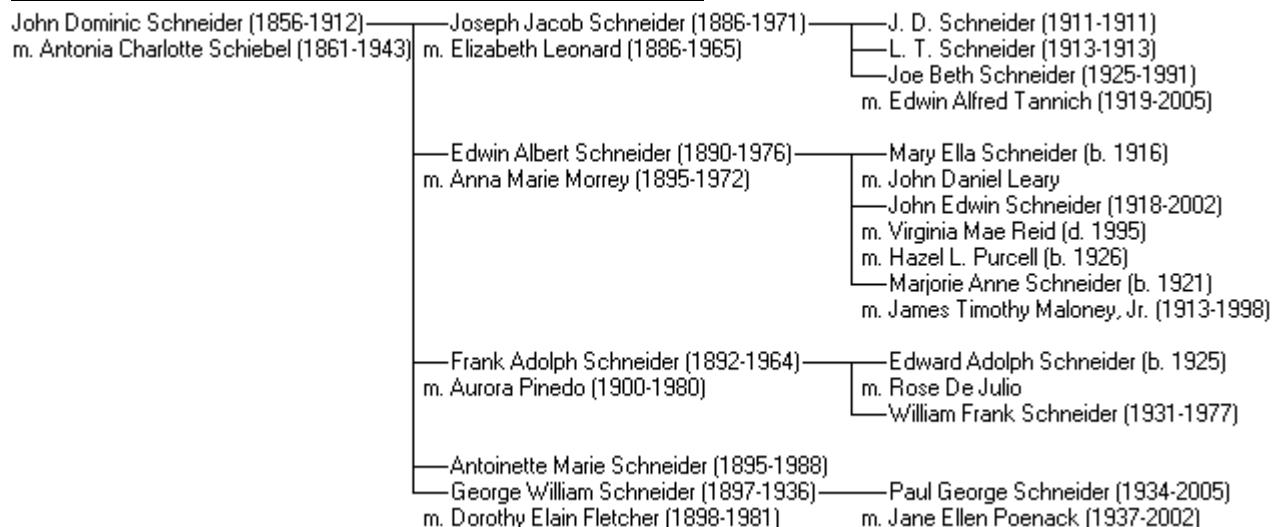

father and Elizabeth's father knew each other and were in the same Knights of Columbus Council together.⁴

By 1910 Joe and Elizabeth had moved to Austin and resided at 306 Crockett, next door to his parents at 308 Crockett.⁵ Joe, his brother Edwin, and his father John D. were all carpenters in the city. The couple had two children who did not survive: J. D. Schneider born 1 May 1911 and died 1 May 1911; and L. T. Schneider born 5 Oct 1913 and died 5 Oct 1913.⁶ Both are buried in Mt. Calvary Cemetery in Austin, Texas alongside the parents.

By 1918 Joe and Elizabeth (both age 33) had returned to San Antonio. In 1918 they lived at 104 Drexell Avenue⁷ and in 1920 at 510 West Gunther Street.⁸ Joe was working as a house carpenter and building contractor.⁹ After returning to San Antonio, they had a daughter, Joe Beth, born 26 Aug 1925 in San Antonio, Bexar County, Texas.¹⁰ In 1930 the family lived at 428 Berkshire Avenue in San Antonio.¹¹

Elizabeth died 21 Mar 1965¹² at her home at 428 Berkshire in San Antonio and Joseph died 9 Dec 1971 in Comfort, Kendall County, Texas.¹³ Both are buried in Mt. Calvary Cemetery, Austin, Texas.

Frank Adolph Schneider 1892-1964

Frank Adolph Schneider, the third child of John Dominic and Antonia Schneider, was born 26 Sep 1892²² in Austin, Travis County, Texas. At age 17 he lived with his family and was a clerk in a dry goods store.²⁴ Frank did not stay as close to home as did most of his relatives. In 1912 at age 19, Frank was “in the navy serving on the ship San Francisco”.²⁵

Frank was of medium height and build, with light blue eyes and light hair. In 1917, he worked as a Bridge Builder for the Southern Pacific Railway and lived at 1055 5th Street in San Diego, California. He served as a 1st Class Fireman for the Navy for 6 years²⁶ and married **Aurora Pinedo**.²⁷

Aurora was born on 17 Apr 1900²⁸ in Mexico²⁹ and was from a wealthy Spanish family.³⁰ She and other family members came to the United States in either 1916³¹ or 1919.³² In 1920 she lived in Oakland, California with her parents and her brothers and sisters and worked as a buffer in a knitting mill.³³

Frank and Aurora married about 1921,³⁴ most likely in Oakland, California. In 1930, the US Census misnamed Frank as Frank “Schnedaur” and his wife’s name is most confusing (see below). This census lists Aurora as having been born in Mexico. Aurora’s mother, Charlotte Pinedo,³⁵ lived with the family at 936 Adeline Street in Oakland, Alameda County, California and Frank worked as a steamship engineer.³⁶ He registered for the draft for World War II and was living at 1026 Magnolia Street in Oakland, California and was working for Moore Drydock Company at the foot of Adeline Street in Oakland.³⁷ In 1942 Frank served in the Merchant Marines.³⁸

Frank and his wife had two children Edward Adolph Schneider and William Frank Schneider, both born in California.³⁹

Frank died 22 Oct 1964 (SSN 573-12-4425) in Oakland, California⁴⁰ and is buried in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Hayward, CA.⁴¹ Aurora died Nov 1980 in Lakewood, Jefferson County, Colorado⁴² in the same town where her son Edward lived, and is buried with Frank in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, Section P Row 6.

George W. Schneider 1897-1936

George W. Schneider, the youngest child of John Dominic and Antonio Schneider, was born 2 Feb 1897^{47 48} in Wichita County, Texas.⁴⁹ During World War I, George served in the 42nd US Infantry Division, Company B of the 117th Supply Train.⁵⁰ This division was known as the "Rainbow Division" and George served in the same unit as his cousin Walter T. Schneider.^{51 52} Following the war in 1920 George, age 22, lived at home with his mother and worked as a carpenter.⁵³ He married **Dorothy Elain (or Elaine) Fletcher**⁵⁴ who was born 3 Nov 1898.⁵⁵ In 1936 he was pilot and was killed in a crop dusting accident when he hit overhead wires in south Texas at Edinburg. He was a resident of Natchitoches, LA at the time of his death.⁵⁶

George and Dorothy had one son, Paul George Schneider born 24 Feb 1934 in Tarrant County, Texas.⁵⁷

George died 7 Nov 1936⁵⁸ and was buried at Mt. Calvary Cemetery in Austin, Texas. Dorothy died 11 Sep 1981 in Lubbock County, Texas.⁵⁹

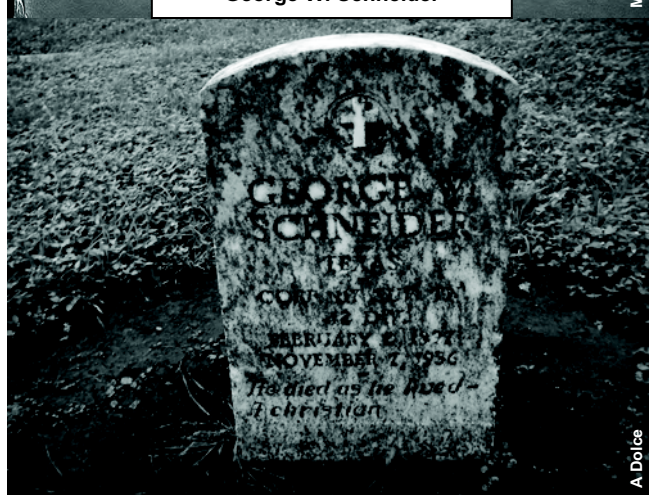

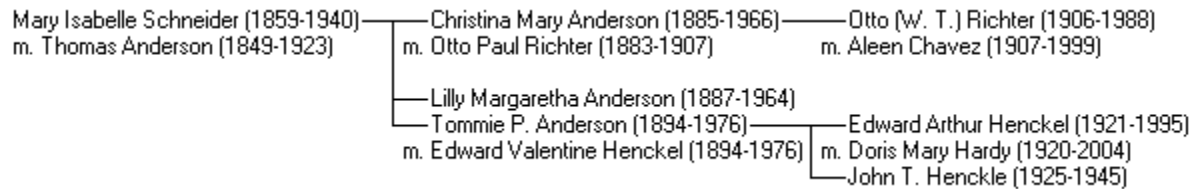

Otto Paul graduated from St. Mary's College (Class of 1900), was president of the Catholic Club, was a warden of the San Antonio Council of the Knights of Columbus and was head bookkeeper of Duerler Manufacturing Company. He resigned from Duerler to become manager of Richter Bakery.⁶ He was the son of San Antonio alderman W. L. Richter. Otto Paul died after a very brief illness at age 23 on 10 Jan 1907 in San Antonio, Bexar County.

Otto's obituary read:

"Otto Richter, son of Mayor protem W. L. Richter, died yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock at his home at 407 South Laredo Street, after an illness of several weeks.

Mr. Richter received his education at St. Mary's College and graduated with honors in the class of 1900. He was after graduating, head bookkeeper for the Deurier Manufacturing Company for a number of years. He resigned recently to manage his father's business.

He was married about a year ago to Miss Christina Anderson. He was a young man of high ideals and character. He leaves behind his wife and a son two months old, his father, mother, several brothers and a sister – Henry, Herman, Rudolph, Gustav and Rose Richter.

Christina and Otto Paul had one son, **William Thomas Richter**, who was named for his two grandfathers (William Richter and Thomas Anderson). William Thomas was only three months old when his father died. After his father's death the family began calling William Thomas "little Otto" and then "Otto". In college he was still William Thomas, but officially changed his name in later years.⁷

Her obituary reads:

Cecilia M. Schneider 1890-1956

Cecilia M. Schneider, daughter of Adolph Herman and Mary Ott Schneider, was born Mar 30, 1890 in Austin, Texas.¹ On 17 Aug 1935² at age 45 she married **Ralph Werner Nuhn**³ from New Braunfels, Texas. Ralph, born 9 Jul 1888,⁴ reportedly was a good friend of her father's.⁵ In actuality, Ralph was the son of Joseph E. Nuhn and Emilie Goldbeck-Loep; and Joseph was the brother of Cecilia's aunt, Christina Nuhn Schneider, wife of Albert Schneider.⁶

The marriage took place just a few months after her mother's death and in 1937 Ralph and Cecelia lived at 601 East 3rd, the home of Cecilia's father.⁷

Ralph grew up in New Braunfels, Texas. In 1910 at age 21 he lived with his mother and step-father, C.C. Malone in Orange, Texas and was employed as a telegraph operator for the railroad.⁸ By 1917 he had moved to Austin and was working as a ticket agent for the railroad.⁹ Later he was a freight traffic manager.¹⁰ During World War I, Ralph served in Company C of the 36th Division, Engineers.¹¹ In 1937 he worked for Elgin Butler Brick Co., first as a clerk,¹² then in 1939 as an auditor for the company and in 1942 as a bookkeeper. In 1944-45 he had been promoted to assistant treasurer.¹³

Cecilia was an active member of St. Mary's Altar and Rosary Societies, St. Vincent de Paul Society, the Legion of Mary and the American Legion Auxiliary.¹⁴ Cecilia and Ralph had no children. Cecilia died Jan 22, 1956¹⁵ and following a Requiem Mass at St. Mary's Cathedral, she was buried in Mt Calvary Cemetery in Austin.¹⁶

Ralph died 24 Jan 1962 in Austin, Texas¹⁷ and is buried in Comal Cemetery, New Braunfels, Comal County, Texas.¹⁸

MRS. CECILIA NUHN

Mrs. Cecelia Schneider Nuhn, 601 East Third St., died in a local hospital Sunday. Mrs. Nuhn was a life-long resident of Austin and was a member of St. Mary's Cathedral. She is survived by her husband, Ralph W. Nuhn, and one brother, Walter T. Schneider. Walter Thomas Schneider, son of Adolph and Mary Schneider, was born 10 Feb 1892.¹⁹ During World War I, Walter served in the US Army with the 42nd Division 117 Supply Train, the same unit in which his cousin George Schneider served. Walter was stationed at Camp Mills in New York before going overseas to France.²⁰ He wrote a letter home to his cousins detailing his life in the military.²¹

After the war, Walter returned to Austin and worked as an auto mechanic and for many years was the head of the service department at Covert

Buick in Austin. At one point Covert let him go, claiming that he focused too much on the customers instead of the company. He started a competing auto repair company, hired away mechanics and refused to go back when Covert asked him.²²

Jeanne Schneider Park remembers that he had one blue eye and one brown eye.²³ This is confirmed by his Registration Card for World War I.

At age 58 Walter married **Marie Margurette (Margaret)**

Jeanette Cappell (born 20 Mar 1908). Walter had broken his leg and was in Seton Hospital when he met Margaret, a nurse who was 10 years younger than he. Her obituary refers to her as Margaret Schneider but she was known as "Frenchy" to family and friends.²⁴

Margaret was born in Guiche, France. She worked at Seton Hospital as a Licensed Vocational Nurse. She was famous for knitting booties for most of the babies born at the hospital. She retired from nursing when she married Walter in 1960.²⁵

Walter owned land in Round Rock, Texas, sold it for \$6 million and moved to Mesa Drive in Austin.²⁶ The couple had no children, although Margaret had a daughter by her first marriage to Kenneth Thomas Cappell.

Walter died 3 Nov 1981²⁷ and Margaret died 13-Oct-1997. Walter is buried in Mt. Calvary Cemetery in Austin, Travis County, Texas and Margaret is buried in Oak Grove Cemetery in Austin, Travis County, Texas.

Margaret's daughter, **Pauline Suzanne Cappell**, was born 28 Dec 1941 in Travis County, Texas and married **Frank Boatright** of Austin, Texas. Pauline was killed in a pedestrian accident on 21 Aug 1998 while walking along a frontage road of IH35 near Jarrell.²⁸ Her husband, Frank, died 25 May 2003. Both are buried in Oak Grove Cemetery, Austin, Travis County, Texas.²⁹

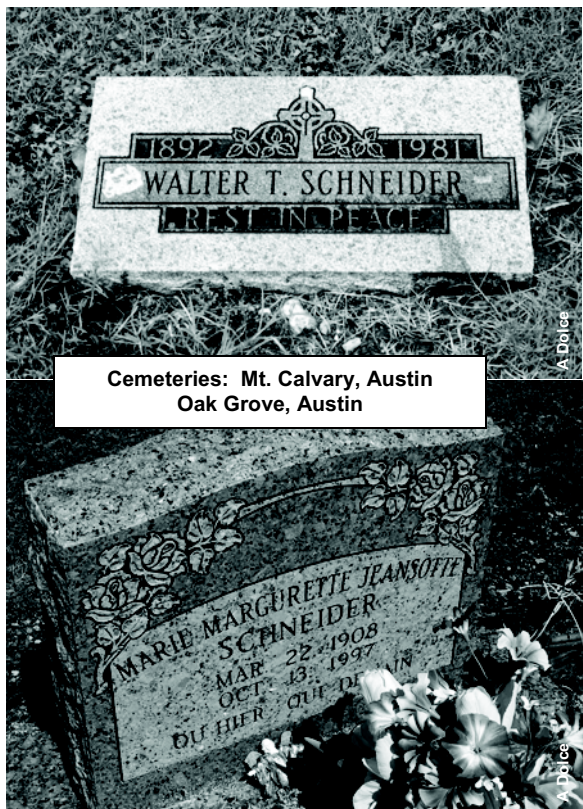
