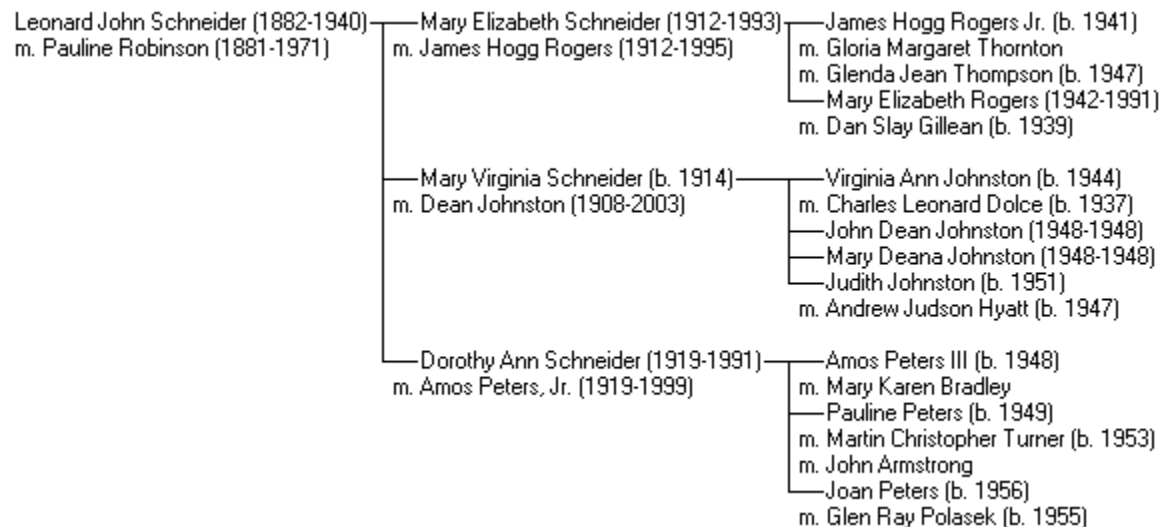

Mary Elizabeth Schneider 1912-1993

Mary Elizabeth “Lizzie” Schneider, oldest daughter of Leonard and Pauline Robinson Schneider, was born in Austin, Texas on 4 Aug 1912.^{1 2}



As the oldest, she paved the way for her sisters and graduated from St. Mary's Academy and the University of Texas at Austin. Elizabeth was a member of Pi Beta Phi Sorority and was selected to be a Bluebonnet Belle.³

On 6 Nov 1939,⁴ she married **James "Jim" Hogg Rogers**, who was born 9 Jan 1912 in Decatur, Texas.⁵ Jim grew up in San Antonio, Texas, graduated from St. Mary's University and received a degree in law from Georgetown University in Washington, D.C.⁶ The couple was married at St. Mary's Church in Austin, Texas⁷ and a Catholic Mass and solemn Benediction completed the ceremony.⁸

Elizabeth Schneider Bride of James Rogers

In a beautiful ceremony at St. Mary's church Monday at 8 p. m., Miss Mary Elizabeth Schneider, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Schneider, became the bride of James Hogg Rogers, son of Mrs. Almoth Dowden Rogers of San Antonio.

Organ music was played by Mrs. J. V. Seigmund, and John Peninger, cousin of the bride, sang Schubert's "Ave Maria," the "Tantum Ergo" and the benediction, "O, Salutaris." The Lohengrin processionals were played as the wedding party entered, and Mendelssohn's wedding march as the recessional.

The Rev. James J. O'Brien, C.S.C., who officiated in the ceremony, was assisted by the Rev. Joseph Branigan, C.S.C., and the Rev. Raymond Clancy, C.S.C.

At the altar before a background of palms were rectangular vases of white Chinese and cushion chrysanthemums flanked by tall white vases in brass candelabra. The pews where the families were seated were marked by floor candlesticks and bouquets of flowers.

Sisters Attend Bride

Misses Virginia and Dorothy Schneider, sisters of the bride, were maids of honor, and her bridesmaids were Misses Flora Louise Robinson, Lucille Sharp and Mary Jo Butler and Mrs. Louis Page, Jr.

Their gowns were made on empire lines of peach-cream slipper satin, having puffed sleeves and crushed necklines. Gracefully draped in the back to form bustles, the skirts fell in soft lines. Bronze velvet picture hats conformed to the shades of the arm bouquets of bronze chrysanthemums and their ribbons of matching hue.

White Satin Gown

The bride's father, L. J. Schneider, gave her in marriage. Her wedding dress, an adaptation of Loheng, was of white satin. The sweetheart neckline was delicately shirred with Chantilly lace, and the bouffant skirt fell into a train. The sleeves were short, and she wore long, white gloves. A coronet of seed pearl held the illusion veil and the blusher, which were bound with white satin. She carried a shower bouquet of white roses and lilies of the valley, and her handkerchief was that which her mother had carried in her own wedding.

Mr. Rogers was attended by Ellis Chaney of San Antonio as best man, Gus Groog and Richard Davis of San Antonio, and Alfred Robinson, Jr., C. N. Avery, Jr., Arthur Duggan, and Stokely Caudie, groomsmen.

Altar boys were Jack and Ed Schneider, A. F. Casey and Francis McClain.

A solemn benediction followed the ceremony.

Reception at Home

After the ceremony a reception was held at the home of the bride's parents.

Mrs. Schneider, mother of the bride, and Mrs. Rogers, mother of the bridegroom, received the guests with the bride and bridegroom and the bridesmaids.

Mrs. Schneider received in a dress of periwinkle crepe with beaded bodice and blue velvet hat. Mrs. Rogers wore a dress of

black crepe with sweetheart neckline and matching hat. Both wore orchid corsages.

White kiltanney roses in a silver container with the ring-shaped wedding cake formed the table decorations, and kiltanney roses in silver holders furnished the illumination. Throughout the house were chrysanthemums and kiltanney roses.

Miss Mary Ellen Pope was at the bride's book.

Trip to Colorado

Mr. and Mrs. Rogers left after the reception for a wedding trip to

Denver, Colo. The bride wore a Schiaparelli model nubby wool suit with double fox fur, black felt hat and white gloves. Her corsage was of orchids.

The bride is a graduate of St. Mary's academy and the University of Texas, where she was a

member of Pi Beta Phi sorority and a Bluebonnet Belle. She is a founder and past president of the Cotillion club, treasurer of the Junior league and member of the Baby Home guild.

Mr. Rogers graduated from St. Mary's university in San Antonio and received his law degree from Georgetown university in Washington, D. C. He is a member of the Bachelors in Austin and of the German club in San Antonio. At present he is a practicing attorney in Austin.

To Live in Austin

Mr. and Mrs. Rogers will return Nov. 18 to make their home in Austin at 1701 Summit View.

Lizzie was always involved in her community and began her volunteer work at the age of 12 in a neighborhood group called "The Busy Bees." She served as president of the Junior League of Austin in 1949-50¹⁰ and founded and was president of the Cotillion Club, a woman's counterpart to the Bachelor's Club.¹¹ In Amarillo she volunteered at St. Anthony's Hospital and was president of the Lawyers' Wives.¹² When she returned to Austin she was instrumental in the development of St. John Neumann Catholic Parish.

Lizzie loved a party and Jim was always ready to oblige. She was famous for her enchiladas and Jim for his barbeque steaks and special "sop" sauce. She was a perfect lady and Jim was irreverent and loved a raucous joke. They made a wonderful pair and were full of love and good humor.¹³

Jim and Elizabeth had two children James Hogg Rogers, Jr. and Mary Elizabeth Rogers.

Lizzie had a stroke in 1991 and the couple moved to the Summit Retirement Complex in Austin in 1993. She died 19 March 1993¹⁴ and Jim died 24 Aug 1995 in Austin, Texas.¹⁵ Jim and Elizabeth are buried in Austin Memorial Park Sec 5B row 35 lots 9 and 10.

James Hogg Rogers

James Hogg Rogers of Austin was born January 9, 1912, at Decatur, Texas, and died August 24, 1995.

He was the youngest and last to die of the nine children born to the late A.D. and Lila Stone Rogers of San Antonio. At a preschool age the family moved from Decatur to Alamo Heights in San Antonio. He was educated in the public schools and St. Mary's University in San Antonio and received his degree in law from Georgetown University in Washington D.C. Upon graduation he moved to Austin where he practiced law for most of his professional life with the exception of a period of 15 years in Amarillo.

He was placed on active duty with the Army ground forces immediately after Pearl Harbor and served for the duration of World War II, including duty in the European Theater of Operation.

His wife of more than 52 years, Elizabeth Schneider Rogers, and his daughter, Mary Rogers Gillean, preceded him in death.

He is survived by his son, James H. Rogers Jr. and wife, Glenda; grandchildren, James H. Rogers III and wife, Dr. Ilene Hatch, Clint T. Rogers, Charlotte E. Rogers, Elizabeth G. Lockwood and husband, Andrew, Amy G. Mueller and husband, Todd, Susan G. Kelly and husband, Rand, Irene G. Teeler and husband, Cliff; four great-grandchildren; son-in-law, Dan S. Mary Virginia “Billie” Schneider was born 30 Jun 1914,¹⁶ the second child of Leonard and Pauline Robinson Schneider. She was nicknamed “Billie” because her father was hoping for a boy and was planning on naming the child William.

Virginia graduated from St. Mary's Academy and was valedictorian of her graduating class.¹⁷ She received a degree from the University of Texas in 1938 and was a member of the Pi Beta Phi sorority and Ownooch.¹⁸ She spent many relaxing summers with her cousin Mary Jo Cooper at Port Aransas.¹⁹ Following graduation she was employed by the Internal Revenue Service and was a member of the Cotillion Club and the Junior League of Austin.²⁰

On 27 May 1943²¹ Virginia married **Dean Johnston**, who was born 30 Dec 1908.²² Following the wedding the couple temporarily moved to Rhode Island, where Dean was stationed with the Navy prior to going overseas. When Dean left for England, Virginia returned to Austin and lived with her mother and sisters.

The bridegroom is the son of Mrs. Lennie Hotel Johnston and the late John Edwin Johnston of Houston. Jennings company of Austin and was a member of the Bachelors' club.

Mrs. Johnston graduated from St. Mary's academy and from the University of Texas with a B. A. degree. She was a member of the Couillon club and of Pi Beta Phi sorority.

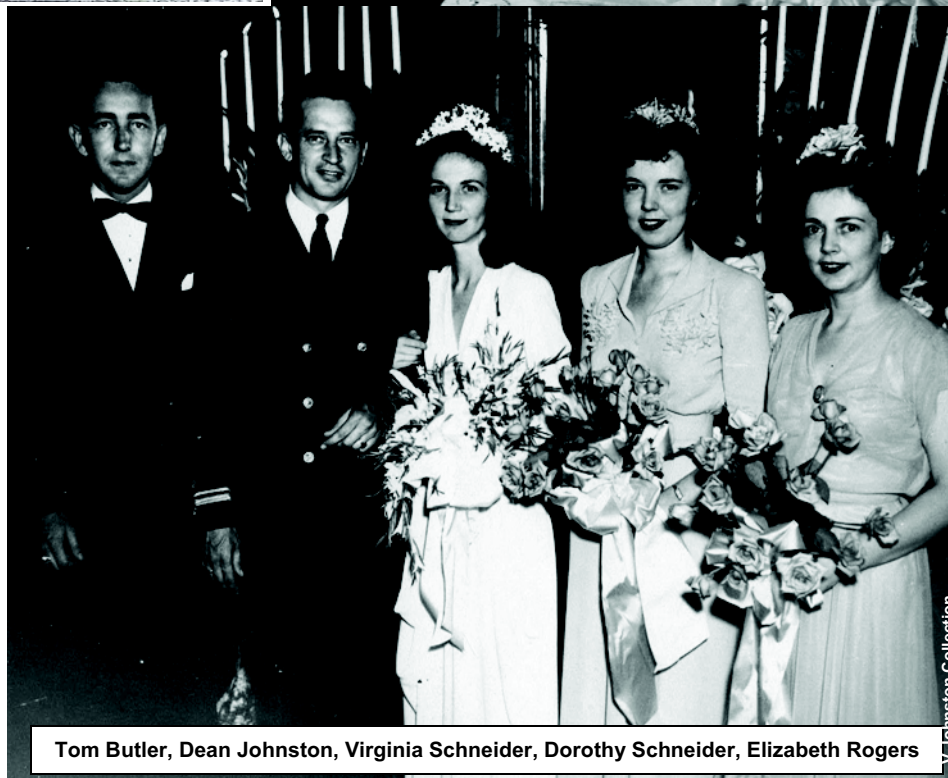
D.R.T. To Meet

Dean was born in Poplar Bluff, MO,²³ and lived with his family in St. Louis, MO, Oklahoma, and Beaumont, Texas. He attended high school in Beaumont and began college at Lamar University. He received a bachelor degree in electrical engineering from Rice University in 1936. While at Rice, he ran cross-country track. Following graduation he went to work for Houston Lighting and Power and then moved to Austin to work for W. K. Jennings as the electrical engineer on the Mansfield Dam project. During World War II, Dean served in the United States Navy as a Seabee, going ashore in Normandy on D-day. He also served in Okinawa preparing for the invasion of Japan.²⁴

When Dean returned from the war in 1946, he joined his wife and daughter and the couple lived at the home of his mother-in-law, Pauline Robinson Schneider. Dean started an electrical engineering and construction company and used the servants' quarters behind the Schneider home at 301 W. 13th Street as his first office.

He had a "fleet of trucks" that consisted of one old truck named Red Rider that had been used to deliver hides. The company incorporated in 1959 as Dean Johnston, Inc., and Dean served as president of the company until his death.

In 1951, the couple moved from the Schneider home to 2500 Hatley Drive in Rollingwood, a suburban area of Austin that was being developed. Dean and Billie resided at Hatley Drive for the next 50 plus years. The couple had four children including twins that were born prematurely and did not survive. The two surviving daughters are Virginia Ann and Judith.

Throughout her life, Virginia has been an active volunteer as a member of the Junior League and the Ladies of Charity, volunteering at the St. Vincent DePaul Thrift Shop and Seton League House. She has been active in the Rollingwood neighborhood association and in her parish, St. Ignatius Martyr Church.

Dean and Billie spent much of their free time at the Lazy J Ranch on Lake Travis

swimming, fishing, raising cattle and caring for the land. A portion of the property that comprises the ranch belonged to the Schneider family and was inherited by Billie. The remaining part of the ranch was

purchased in the 1960s. The ranch was a labor of love for each of them and they passed on their love of nature, animals and sports to their children and grandchildren.

Dean had a very subtle and dry sense of humor. He loved sports and taught his daughters to love the outdoors, to hunt, to study hard "and show thy self approval". He was an ardent supporter of the Rice Owls. Billie taught him to enjoy Longhorn football, carrying on a tradition of attending UT home games that began when she was a child. But there was never a doubt where his true loyalty stood when UT played Rice.

Dean and Billie were dedicated to the Catholic Church and the Austin community. They were regular contributors to their parish, St. Ignatius, and financially supported the establishment of St. Michael's Catholic Academy in the 1980s. Dean was a long time supporter of the Settlement Club and in 1997 he received a Ministry Award from the Austin Diocese for his work on the Del Valle Correctional Facility. In 2000, the couple donated 11 acres of the Lazy J Ranch land to the Austin Diocese for the establishment of Queen of Angels Chapel.



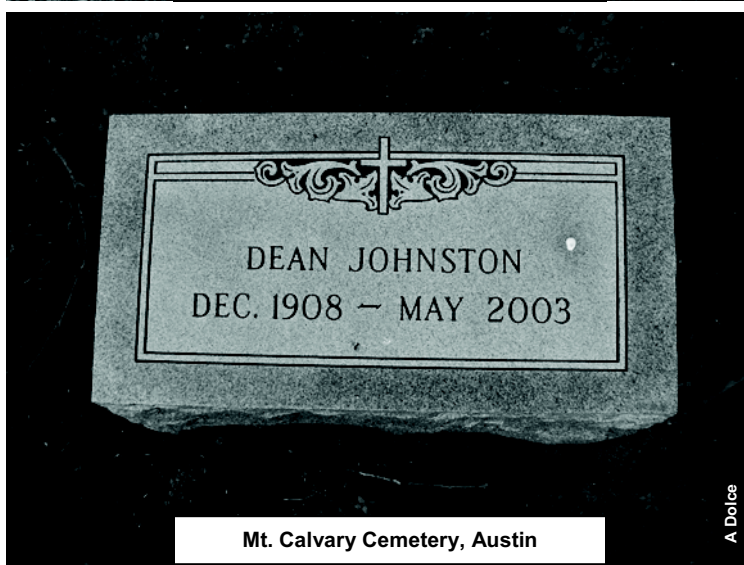

Dean Johnston passed away Thursday, May 15, 2003 at the age of 94. He was born December 30, 1908 in Puplar Bluff, Missouri.

Mr. Johnston attended high school in Beaumont, TX and graduated from Rice University in 1936 with a degree in Electrical Engineering. Upon his graduation he worked for Houston Lighting and Power and then moved to Austin where he worked for W.K. Jennings as Electrical Engineer on the Mansfield Dam Project. He served in the United States Navy during World War II, going ashore in Normandy on D-Day. After returning from the war, Mr. Johnston started his own Electrical Engineering and Construction Company. Over the next 54 years Dean Johnston, Inc. grew along with Austin with Mr. Johnston serving as President until his death.

He is survived by his wife of 60 years, Virginia Schneider Johnston; daughters, Ann Johnston Dolce and husband Leonard, Judith Johnston Hyatt and husband Andrew; grandsons, Christopher Dolce and wife Kacy, Jeffrey Dolce and wife Amy, Andrew "Jay" Hyatt, Christopher Hyatt and granddaughter, Catherine Dolce Daboub and husband Keith; along with five great-grandchildren.

The bride is a graduate of St. Mary's Academy here and of the University of Texas. She was a member of Pi Beta Phi sorority, Omicron and the Cotillion Club. From 1942 through 1946, she was secretary of the Austin USO Club.

Mr. Taylor received his bachelor of arts and his law degrees from the University of Texas, where he was a member of Chi Phi fraternity. Discharged in January, 1946, after serving overseas three years as radar officer and captain with the Air Forces, he is now a member of the law firm, Peters and Peters, in Taylor.

They wore hair hats of matching velvet, and their flowers were spray bouquets of pink Purdy roses.

Mary Elizabeth Rogers, flower girl, wore pink velvet in off-shoulder style, with a nosegay of cardinal red carnations.

Bride Gowned in Creme Satin

Mrs. Peters was gowned in creme satin, the gown fashioned with sweetheart neckline, Chantilly lace edging, puff sleeves, hobnail skirt, basque waist and full-length gloves. Her long veil bound in satin fell from a coronet of seed pearls and she carried a shower bouquet of orchids, carnations, and stephanotis. Her jewelry was an antique pearl bar pin, gift of the groom.

On Feb. 1, 1947 she married Amos Peters Jr. and resided in Taylor since that date.

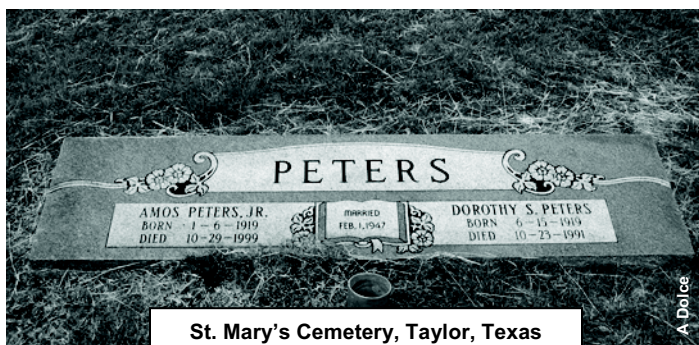

Charles Joseph “Charlie” Schneider, Jr. was born 12 Oct 1916¹ in Austin, Texas, the only child of Charles and Lois Schneider. “Junior,” as he was known until the death of his father in 1939, was the apple of his parents’ eye. Charlie was seriously injured in a fall from a roof; his arm was fractured and an infection occurred.² Charlie’s arm and shoulder were substantially crippled by the accident which happened when he was a young teenager.³ Charlie was fascinated by animals (especially dogs and horses), guns and knives; he usually had a pistol and a knife on his belt when he was in the country.⁴

Charlie graduated from the University of Texas School of Engineering and was employed by the Texas State Highway and Transportation Department for over 36 years, retiring in 1977.⁵ He

was also a member of the Knights of Columbus.⁶

On 29 Dec 1960⁷ Charlie married **Mabel Irene Nabours**, born 27 May 1909 in Montague, Texas. She was a graduate of Texas State Women’s University in Denton and a teacher for 16 years at Brykerwood and Highland Park Elementary Schools in the Austin Independent School District. Mabel was a member of Tarrytown United Methodist Church of Austin and was musical, directing the church choir and planning musical plays for school events.⁸ Mabel had a daughter, Elizabeth, by a previous marriage and Elizabeth was adopted by Charlie.⁹

Charlie died 19 Jun 1986¹⁰ and Mabel died 23 Nov 2001.¹¹ Both are buried in Austin Memorial Park, Austin, TX¹²

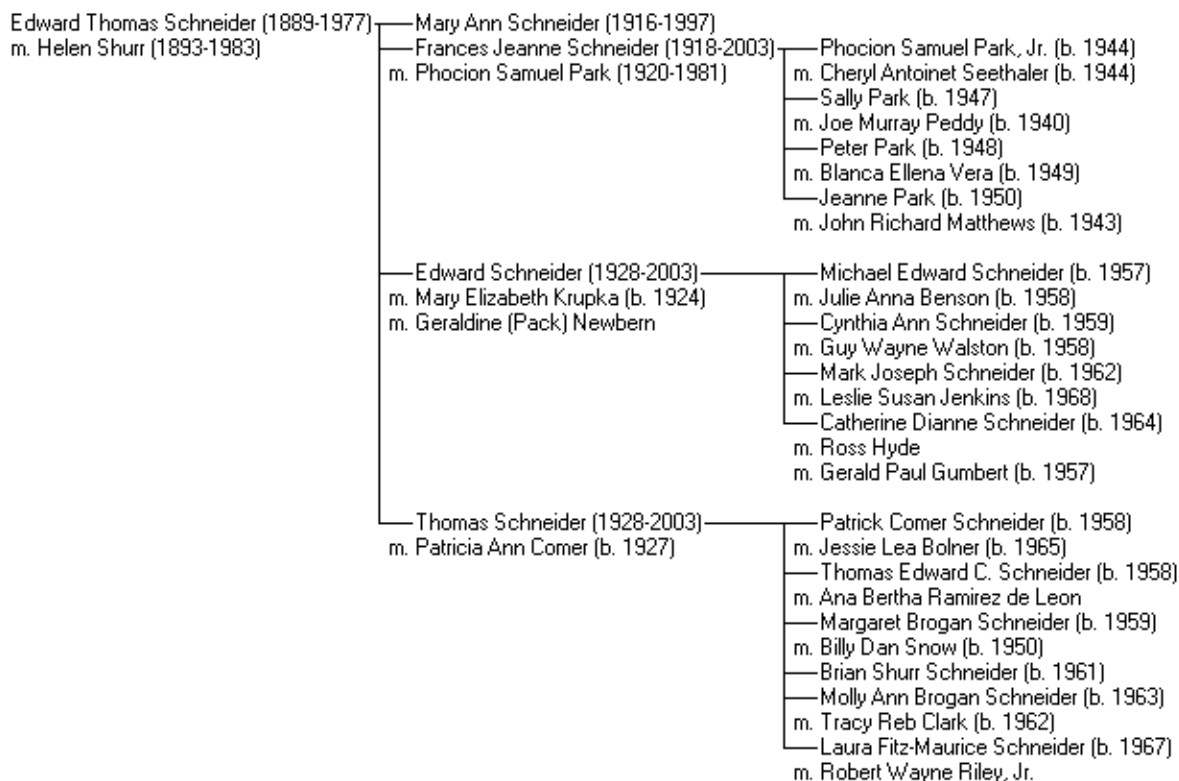

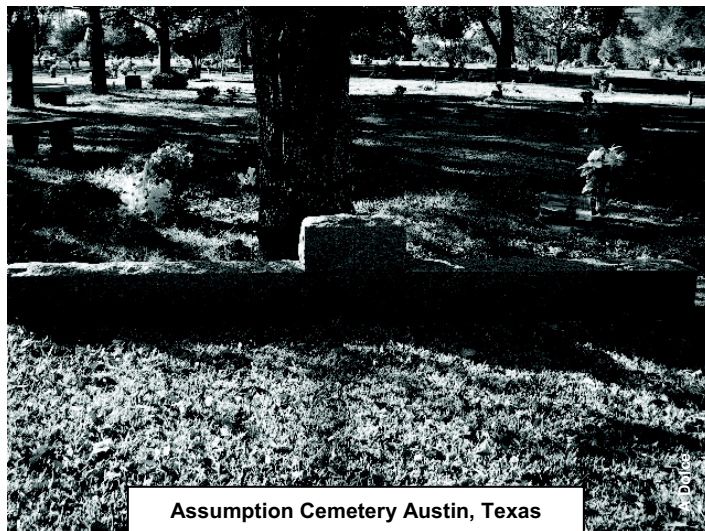

A geologist, with a bachelor's degree and master's degree from the University of Texas, he moved to Midland, TX in the 1950s. He married **Patricia Comer** of Cincinnati, Ohio on 23 Jun 1956.¹⁷

Patricia, born 26 Jul 1926 in Cincinnati, received a

bachelor's degree in psychology from the Univ. of Cincinnati and a Master's degree in Education from Xavier University. She was a private pilot in the 1950s traveling around the country when she met her future husband in Midland, Texas. They married at her home in Cincinnati, Ohio and lived in Midland, Texas following their marriage.

Tom **Schneider**, of Midland, passed away Tuesday, June 17, 2003.

Tom was born to E.T. and Helen **Schneider** on September 19, 1928 in Austin, Texas. He graduated from the University of Texas in 1950 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Geology. Tom followed his Bachelors Degree with a Master of Arts Degree in Geology from the same institution. As a part of his Master's practicum, he performed substantial fieldwork in Culberson County. This fieldwork laid the basis for his later discovery of the second largest deposit of sulfur in the United States, which was operated by Duval Corporation.

On June 23, 1956, he married Patricia Comer of Cincinnati, Ohio. Together they had six children. Tom started in the oil business as a geologist with Lario Oil and Gas and Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Company. He became an independent geologist and oil operator in 1956, ultimately founding Topat Oil. A real entrepreneur, he was involved with numerous successful oil, gas, mineral, banking and real estate ventures.

With the exception of a nine-year stay in Eagle Pass, Texas, the family resided in Midland from 1951 until the time of his passing. While in Eagle Pass, he and his wife founded Rio Grande Sand and Gravel and Topat Ranches and he continued his pursuit of oil, gas, coal and minerals in South Texas as well as involvement in community affairs.

Tom was a member of the American Association of Petroleum Geologists, the West Texas Geological Society and the Society of Independent Professional Earth Scientists. In 1954, he was a founding member of the Permian Basin Section of SEPM. He was a past member of the Geology Foundation Advisory Council of the University of Texas at Austin. Other organizations Tom belonged to include The Midland Exchange Club, Midland Petroleum Club, Texas Longhorn Foundation Lifetime Member, Texas Exes and St. Ann's Catholic Church. He was an avid collector and sports fan.

Tom is survived by his loving wife of 47 years Patricia and their six children, Patrick Comer **Schneider** and his wife Jesse Lea of Southern Presidio County, Thomas Edward **Schneider**, his wife Ana, and their daughter Kelsi of Midland, Maggie **Schneider** Snow, her husband Billy, and their daughter Danielle of Kerrville, Brian Shurr **Schneider** of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Molly **Schneider** Clark, and her husband Reb, and their sons, Seth, Duncan and Cooper of Midland, and Laura Fitz-Maurice **Schneider** of Fort Worth, along with a twin brother Edward **Schneider** and his wife Gerri and many nieces and nephews.

Otto (William Thomas) Richter: 1906-1988

Otto (William Thomas) Richter, the only child of Otto Paul Richter and Christina Mary Anderson Richter, was born 30 Oct 1906¹⁷ in San Antonio, Texas. He was named for his two grandfathers: William L. Richter, founder of Richter's Butter Krust Bakeries¹⁸ and Thomas Anderson. He began his life with the name William Thomas Richter and was only two or three months old when his father died following a brief illness. After his father's death he was called "Little Otto" and then Otto. He eventually had his name legally changed to "Otto".¹⁹



Otto was a member of the first graduating class of St. Mary's University. He spent his professional life working in the family business, serving as Vice President of Production for the San Antonio, Austin and Corpus Christi bakeries. Mr. Richter was a member of the

American Society of Bakery Engineers and served as president of the association in 1949. He also served as president of the Texas Baker's Association and was a member of the Order of the Alhambra, the Knights of Columbus, the Kiwanis Club and the International Mission Radio Association.²⁰

On 14 Apr 1938 he married **Aleen Chavez**, born 21 Oct 1907, the daughter of Alexander Chavez and Ida Beavesdorf Chavez. She was a direct descendant of the Canary Island families of Curbelo, de Armas Padron and Travleso, sent by the King of Spain to settle San Antonio. Aleen's father, Alex Chavez, ran the lunch counters at Joske's and Wolfe & Marx department stores in the 1930s and 1940s. Ladies who shopped downtown, dressed in heels and wearing hats and gloves, considered it a treat to lunch at Wolfe & Marx. Alex Chavez was known city wide for his enchiladas.²¹

Aleen attended St. Anthony's School and Our Lady of the Lake College, both in San Antonio. She was an accomplished pianist and met Otto while he was taking violin lessons from Aleen's piano teacher at Our Lady of the Lake College. Aleen was active as a charter member of the Sultanas de Bexar, a member of the Conservation Society, Shearer Hills Garden Club, Double Ring Dance Club and Our Lady of the Lake Alumnae Association.²²

Otto and Aleen had six children, all born in San Antonio, Bexar County, Texas: Joan, Barbara, Rosalie, Otto Jr., Thomas John and Christina Mary.

Otto died 15 Apr 1988²³ in San Antonio and Aleen died 8 Oct 1999²⁴ in San Antonio, Texas. Both are buried at Holy Cross Cemetery in San Antonio, Texas.²⁵
